State of the Union Address

President Donald Trump's third address

On Feb. 4., President Donald Trump delivered his third State of the Union address shortly after the acquittal from the Senate. Highlighting the achievements of the past year, President Trump also spoke about numerous guests and their stories.

Several freshman representatives did not attend the State of the Union, which has drawn criticism from their colleagues. Reps. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez and Ayanna Pressley announced that they would not be attending the State of the Union due to the “illegitimacy” of President Trump’s speech. Pressley called the address a “sham” and even questioned the legitimacy of Trump’s presidency.

Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi was filled with mixed emotions during the speech. Few of President Trump’s points received an applaud from the speaker. At the end of the State of the Union, speaker Pelosi proceeded to tear her copy of President Trump’s speech. Some saw it as an act of solidarity, others saw it as highly disrespectful to the families who were brought up during the speech.

President Trump spoke proudly of the U.S. during the State of the Union. Several points were made about the economic conditions that Trump takes credit for. Unemployment, growth and the stock market were all brought up during the speech.

“The days of our country being used, taken advantage of, and even scorned by other nations are long behind us,” President Trump said. “Gone, too, are the broken promises, jobless recoveries, tired platitudes and constant excuses for the depletion of American wealth, power and prestige.”

President Trump has strived to implement policies that benefit minorities in order to elevate them. School choice, fewer illegal immigrants and more jobs were all factors brought up to help increase opportunities for minorities to succeed.

“We are advancing with unbridled optimism and lifting our citizens of every race, col-

or, religion and creed very, very high. Since my election, we have created 7 million new jobs, 5 million more than government experts projected during the previous administration,” President Trump said.

President Barack Obama and his administration were also brought up numerous times in an effort to display the effectiveness of President Trump’s policies. Trump highlighted that without his leadership, the U.S. would not be in the successful state that it is today.

“If we hadn’t reversed the failed economic policies of the previous administration, the world would not now be witnessing this great economic success,” Trump said.

Trade was another hot topic brought up by Trump. More

specifically, the United States, Mexico and Canada Agreement (USMCA) and its predecessor the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) pushed by President Bill Clinton.

“One of the biggest promises I made to the American people was to replace the disastrous NAFTA trade deal. In fact, unfair trade is perhaps the single biggest reason that I decided to run for president,” President Trump said. “Following NAFTA’s adoption, our nation lost one in four manufacturing jobs. Many politicians came and went, pledging to change or replace NAFTA, only to do so and then absolutely nothing happened. But unlike so many who came before me, I keep my promises. We did our job.”

The Education Freedom Scholarships and Opportunities Act and the First Step Act were also brought up and received roars of applaud. A family was brought up when President Trump spoke about the freedom to choose the school you want to go to, which most Democrats don’t agree with. The First Step act helped reduce sentencing for some non-violent criminals and encouraged training programs for prisoners.

President Trump brought up historical figures from the U.S. near the end of the speech. “America is the land of heroes,” as Trump put it by listing names such as Abraham Lincoln, Frederick Douglass, Amelia Earhart and multiple others. The American pride

was felt by much of the crowd as Trump wrapped up the State of the Union.

“The American age, the American epic, the American adventure has only just begun. Our spirit is still young. The sun is still rising. God’s grace is still shining. And my fellow Americans, the best is yet to come.

Thank you, God bless you, and God bless America.” President Trump said.

Student debt isn’t something new or unheard of when attending a college or university, but there are some ways individuals can help tackle their debt. The average student loan debt as of 2019 is \$31,172 but varies depending on major and length of time in school. Students wanting an estimate on their tuition and fees can go to <https://und.edu/admissions/cost-and-aid/cost.html>. UND has many scholarship opportunities for students to

help them reduce their student debt while furthering their education.

On February 13 students have a chance of winning a scholarship through Giving Hearts Day by signing up at <https://undalumni.org/giving-hearts-day>. It is the largest regional giving day in the upper Midwest with over 450 non-profits participating. Giving Hearts Day raises funds and awareness for specific causes like for UND students and to promote philanthropy education. Giving Hearts Day in 2019 gave over \$150,000 and

UND has awarded more than 2,000 academic scholarships adding up to about \$7.8 million each year for undergraduates, graduates, and law students. Coronavirus Update

Be weary of travel and stay safe!

Last week the official death toll for the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (2019-nCoV) officially surpassed the 2003 SARS outbreak. The number of infected is more than 37,000 as of Sunday and the death toll has reached over 800 with two deaths outside of China. The first death outside of China was reported in the Philippines and the second was reported in Hong Kong.

With a cruise ship under quarantine, the number of Americans under quarantine has reached over 800. There have been 12 confirmed cases in the U.S. in six states with Wisconsin being the newest addition. Over 26 countries have now confirmed the coronavirus, but casualties are still low everywhere apart from China.

Some are still skeptical about the severity of the coronavirus outbreak considering that nearly 3,000 have recovered and most of the casualties have resulted from poor overall health or immune system problems. However, several articles published by various universities are questioning the official figures that China is releasing. Some estimate the number of casualties could be as high as 150,000.

The demand for masks in China has skyrocketed following the coronavirus outbreak. Several industries in China are being affected due to a concerned population and uncertainty. The global economy might suffer from the lack of productivity in China, which in turn could lead to more problems amid the outbreak.

Two new hospitals have been completed in Wuhan, the epicenter of the outbreak, in an effort to

slow the spread and death rate of the disease. Conditions in the hospitals are being questioned due to the speed at which the hospitals were built. The two hospitals hold 2,700 patients, but pictures show a cramped environment with little to stop the spread of the disease.

Much of Africa and all of South America have still yet to be hit by the coronavirus. Travel restrictions have been put in place by nearly every country suffering from confirmed cases to help fight the spread of the disease. With the first case of person to person spread happening in the U.S. and a newborn baby contracting the disease from its mother, researchers are doing their best to slow down the damage. Multiple anti-viral medications have been used to no avail, but the research will continue.

Australia has been one of the first countries to successfully replicate the virus in a lab setting, which means that they're one step closer to finding a vaccine. There have been reports that China has been testing HIV medication on patients. There have been no confirmed reports of any medication working to treat the coronavirus.

State of The Union Recognition

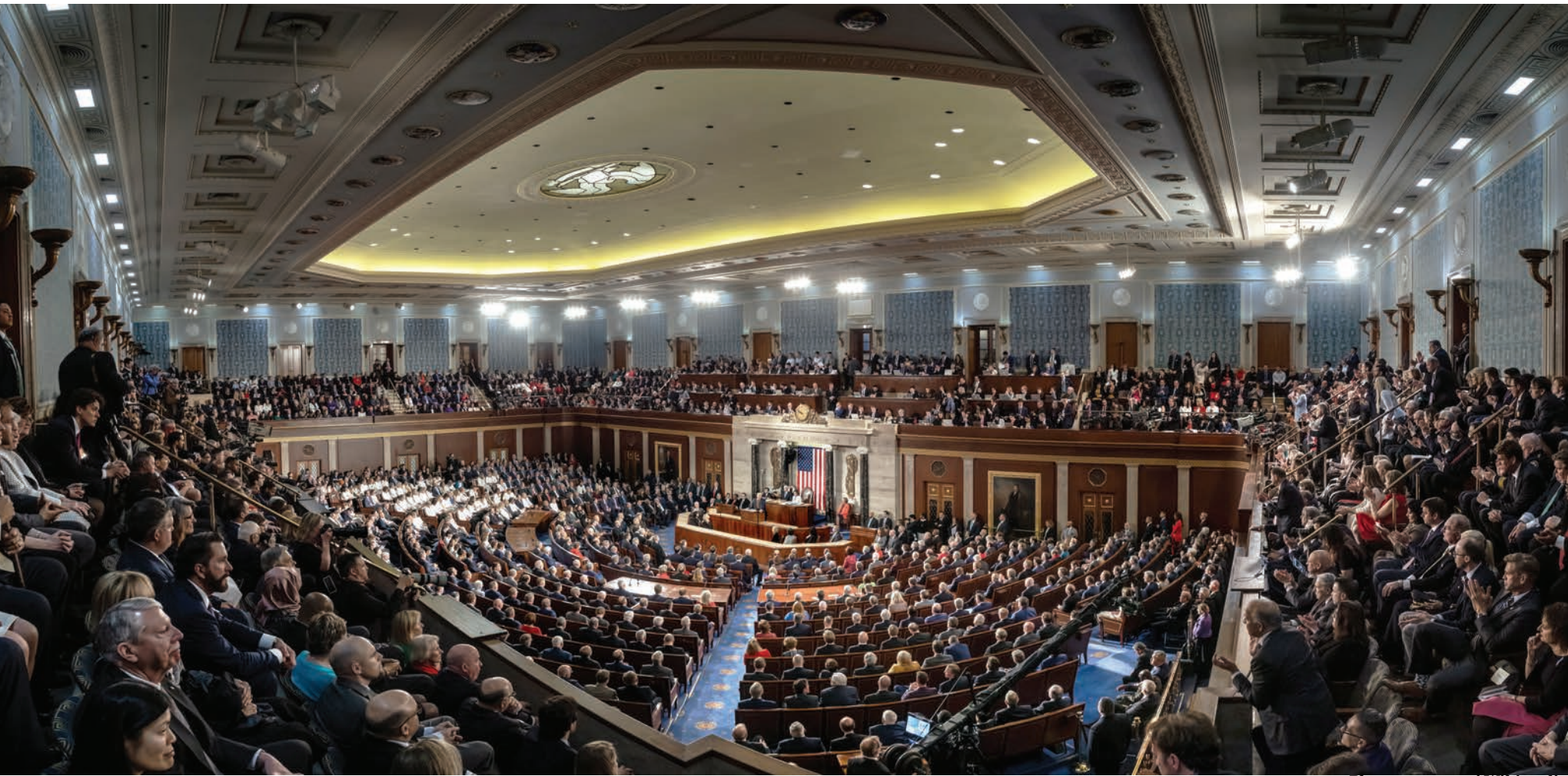

Kelli and Gage Hake: The Hake's are from Stillwater, Okla. Christopher Hake, Kelli's husband, was killed by Qasem Soleimani—an Iranian terrorist leader. Christopher was killed by a roadside bomb that was placed to kill U.S. service members. This year, President Trump ordered the

killing of Soleimani because of his efforts to continue to kill U.S. service members.

Jody Jones: Jody Jones attended the SOTU in honor of his brother, Rocky Jones, who was killed by an illegal immigrant. Rocky was murdered by someone who had to be released from prison because of policy. The illegal immigrant had been deported two previous times. After his release from prison, the same illegal immigrant injured many people. Robbed gas stations, caused a high-speed chase with law enforcement and killed Rocky in what was called a "reign of terror."

Iain Lanphier: Lanphier is an eighth grader from Scottsdale, Ariz. He is the great-grandson of Charles McGee (see below). He was the top graduate from the Aerospace Career Education program that is put on by the Organization of Black Aerospace Professionals. Lanphier hopes to continue his family's story by going to the Air Force Academy and going to space.

Retired Brigadier General Charles McGee: McGee is one of the last living members of the Tuskegee Airmen. He flew 409 aerial

fighter combat missions during his 30 years of military service. During President Trump's State of the Union, McGee received his stars pinned to his uniform to commemorate his dedication to our country.

Rush Libaugh: Libaugh received the Presidential Medal of Freedom at this year's State of the Union because of his contribution to life in America. Limbaugh has been a radio host for more than 30 years, he discusses the American political system and government.

Paul Morrow: Morrow is an Army vetran who is from Montgomery, Ala. After his time in the Army, Morrow started a new concrete plant that supports new F-35 jets that are stations around Montgomery.

Carl and Marsha Mueller: Carl and Marsha attended the State of the Union in honor of their daughter Kayla. Kayla was an aid worker who was kidnapped by ISIS after working in a hospital in Aleppo with Doctors without Borders. Kayla was held captive, tortured and later murdered by the leader of ISIS, Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi. President Trump ordered a raid that was successful and killed

Kayla's captor.

Deputy Chief Raul Ortiz: Deputy Ortiz is from Del Rio, Texas and has been a part of U.S. Border Patrol since 1991. Last year, he was promoted to Chief Patrol Agent, which caused him to become responsible for all 41 counties in Texas. He has been awarded the Superior Civilian Service Medal which is amongst the Department of Defense's highest honors for civilians.

Tony Rankins: Rankins previously served in the U.S. Army in Afghanistan. After his deployment, he suffered PTSD and became addicted to drugs. Joshua Smith: Joshua attended the State of the Union in honor of his brother, Channing Smith. Channing committed suicide in September of 2019 because of a cyber-attack by his fellow high school students via social media.

The Williams Family: Amy Williams and their two children are a military family whose father and husband had been deployed on his fourth deployment. At this year's State of the Union, the entire family was reunited.

It is important to remember that throughout our daily lives as college students, there are families who are grieving, fighting and sacrificing numerous opportunities to fight for our continuous freedom. It shouldn't matter if we lean left or we lean right, each of these groups or individuals recognized at this year's State of the Union have sacrificed many things to bring us our freedoms.

The Genius of Damien Chazelle

Since 2014, Damien Chazelle has directed three films and became the youngest person to win both the Golden Globe and Academy Award for directing at the age of 32. These three films, Whiplash, La La Land and First Man, have a distinct style and view of the world that firmly places Chazelle in the category of auteur. For Chazelle's first two films he not only directed but also wrote the screenplay which secures his place as an auteur even further.

Chazelle's first major film, Whiplash, follows a young jazz drummer, Andrew and his cutthroat teacher, Fletcher. “The problem with being in the play is that you cannot see yourself. I was pretty open, and I let everybody give me feedback when we were running the rehearsals when everybody was there. They would give me different suggestions. So, it was kind of a collaborative project,” Coudle-King said.

Sometimes it can be complicated to connect yourself to a character. To overcome this complication, it is important for the actor to do thorough research and to study their character.

“I tried to imagine what it would be like for my character, and I just started to act. It helped me to become that character,” Coudle-King said.

Love/Sick includes very unique and exciting stories that carry their own message to each one of us. You will find yourself laughing, crying and feeling the emotions of the actors. You will feel excited and confused, amazed and disappointed, sad and happy. Thus, you will never get bored watching this play.

“It is a very contemporary play. This play is only a couple years old and we are the first people in North Dakota to do it. I discovered it last year, and when I saw this play I wanted to try doing it. I just really like the format of ten minute pieces,” Coudle-King said.

It takes time and patience to do a rehearsal, however, everyone who participates in the play knows that it is worth it. Preparations for this performance started in December.

“The really nice thing about this play is that we worked six weeks. So everybody worked six weeks of a ten minute piece. We started in December, and continued from there. Everybody had to work really hard. It was almost like a scene study class,” Coudle-King said.

Thirteen people were involved in this play. Some of them are already experienced actors; others came to try their acting skills for the first time, but what makes them all bonded is a passion for theater.

“Working with new people was perfect because we could talk about movement on stage and how to find a character. It makes it more exciting and fresh. I thank all of them for placing their trust in me. It has been a pleasure to work with everyone,” Coudle-King said.

An acting couple, Becca Cruger who is playing Woman and Jill, and Ben Schille who is playing Man and Keith are pretty new to The Fire Hall Theater. Love/Sick is Becca’s first production at the Fire Hall, while it is a second production for Ben. They shared their experience acting at the Fire Hall Theater.


“We had a lot of fun rehearsing the play. Since we are a couple in real life, it was challenging in the beginning when we first started acting because Ben is super passionate about theater, and I really like public speaking and being in front of crowds,” Cruger said. “For Ben to be super passionate about theater and to work together sometimes can be complicated. but acting is a little bit different in that where you have to be vulnerable with whoever you in the scene with to be able to play off each other and make it real. So, it was a different level of learning experience when we rehearsed with Becca. It was a huge learning experience for both of us,” Schille said.

Overall, Becca and Ben enjoyed being a part of a Love/Sick together.

“It has been a lot of fun to create something together, and then to see how audiences respond to it together,” Cruger said.

Although Love/Sick portrays many different stories at once, it is important to know that each of these stories are relatable. At least one of the situations portrayed off stage can be related to a real life experience.

“These are very real situations that kind of played

up a little bit. Part of each one is something that a whole lot of people have gone through something that is similar to that, something that people can relate to,” Schille said.

UND Softball Opens Season Strong in Texas

The University of North Dakota softball team opened their season this weekend with a trip to San Antonio for the H-E-B Classic hosted by the University of Incarnate Word. The H-E-B Classic was a tournament consisting of five games over a three-day span. This would be a great opportunity for Head Coach Jordan Stevens to finally see his team in action. UND will not play a game in the Dakotas until late March as the majority of their season will be spent flying and driving across the country for tournaments in California, Louisiana, North Carolina and more. The UND world tour opened this weekend in Texas where they came away with a record of 3-2.

The Hawks weekend

opened against Creighton of the Big East falling 7-5 in a hard fought game filled with missed opportunities as UND left runners stranded in scoring position in three of the first four innings. A five run rally in the bottom of the sixth sparked by senior Angel Love two run bomb came up just short as UND was unable to get the tying run across.

In the circle Jannay Jones had a tough start to the season and was rung up with the loss after giving up six earned runs over 3.1 innings. Sophomore Lexi Flom was excellent in relief, sitting down nine of the 10 batters she faced.

Game two of Friday against the hosts Incarnate Word had to be settled in extras but was led by the pitching and power of Nikki Pica who not only got the win for her 2.2 innings

in the circle but also hit two homeruns in two at bats.

Pica played hero twice in this ball game as her sixth inning solo shot tied the game up at three and sent it to extras. In her very next and only other at bat of the day she smacked a two run shot in the eighth that would later win them the game. The senior from Laguna Niguel, Calif. is sure to see more plate appearances after this performance.

Freshman Lauren Feld was outstanding in her first career college start after allowing three runs, only one of which was earned, in her 4.2 innings of work. Cassie Castaneda was also pivotal in this win with an RBI double late in the eighth inning to secure the first win of the season for UND.

Saturday's tilt opened with an ugly game against Incarnate Word as the host

looked for revenge from the previous days loss. UIW's freshman pitcher Madison Floyd was lights out pitching the complete game shutout while only allowing two hits on the day. Floyd was a rubix cube in the circle that day and UND batters were unable to solve it.

Hawks pitcher Madi Moore was roughed up in her first outing of the season, only lasting one inning while giving up five runs in the process. This performance will hopefully fuel her for a better season to come.

After a tough loss in the morning where the bats seemed to be sleeping, the Hawks got just what they needed in a one woman show put on by Jannay Jones. Against Texas Southern Jones shined throwing a complete game and only allowed two runs

on five hits. Jones seemed a different pitcher than the one that was called on for the season opener and was also effective with the bat as she was able to draw two walks and score a run.

Junior outfielder, McKenzie Ryan led the way offensively in this contest going two for four with an RBI leading to the 5-2 win.

UND ended the tournament with a bang lead by a gem of a game from Lauren Feld. In just her third collegiate appearance, Feld went the distance going seven innings while only giving up one run. She showed experience and tenacity on the mound by bending but not breaking in the contest, escaping from multiple jams through the contest. Feld was also a force with the bat as she kept up the weekends trend of pitchers hitting home runs.

The freshman from Moreno Valley, Calif. connected with one in the third leading to the eventual 6-2 win. This made it back-to-back complete games for UND.

In the long, travel-filled opening two months of the college softball season momentum and the confidence it brings is so important to a team's success. Finishing 3-2 in the opening tournament of the season will hopefully do that for the Hawks. UND's world tour continues next week as they head to cajun country for the Louisiana Classic where they will face two nationally ranked opponents in No. 10 Louisiana and No. 11 LSU.

Oral Roberts Height Too Much for UND

Fighting Hawks finished strong but were unable to come away with a win at home

Montserrat Brotons, a 6-foot-4-inch center from Spain proved to be too much for the Fighting Hawks, scoring a game and career high 20 points in the paint for Oral Roberts.

Oral Roberts is a post-oriented team.

"That's just where a majority of our offense is generated," Oral Roberts Head Coach Misti Cussen said. "That's more of our focus in every game, not just a North Dakota thing."

UND's most experienced post and top scorer Julia Fleecs got into foul trouble early, causing her to play 10 minutes under her average playing time.

"For us, it was our post presence," Fleecs said. "We worked all week, dominating in there. We did that in the first half. We dropped off in the second half."

The Fighting Hawks had a great first quarter outscoring the Golden Eagles 20-15 making eight out of 14 from the field.

The Hawks played a fast-paced game. Going

into the halftime break UND held a small two-point lead, 33-31. Jaclyn Jarrot scored eight of her total 14 points in the first half.

The Golden Eagles outscored the Fighting Hawks 27-14 in the third quarter to put them ahead 58-47. Oral Roberts led by as much as 18 points early in the fourth but UND pulled within seven points with 2:35 remaining. Unfortunately, UND could not get the job done, losing 86-72.

"We didn't do a good enough job of keeping them off the free-throw line in the third quarter," said Head Coach Travis Brewster. "I thought we did a good job of executing our defense in the post during the first half, sagging enough to pressure on our double teams just enough and we just didn't do that in the second half. You can't guard anyone at the free-throw line. We have to make sure we execute for 40 minutes."

Four Fighting Hawks players were in double digits. UND was led by the Jarrot sisters, Jaclyn scored 14 points while Alaina fol-

lowed with 13 points and five assists. The freshman from Pequot Lakes, Minn. Olivia Lane earned her first start of the year and third double-double scoring 13 points and 13 rebounds, eight of those rebounds came in the first half. Fleecs was also in double digits with 11 points.

The Fighting Hawks and Golden Eagles are now both 5-5 in the Summit League play. UND is 14-9 overall. The Golden Eagles earned their second road win of the season.

"You have to let this one sting a little," Brewster said. "(Sunday) is a great opportunity to play a team ranked in the Top 25. You have to earn it. They are not going to give it to you. They don't make a lot of mistakes."

The Fighting Hawks next matchup is against Western Illinois away in Macomb, Ill. at 4:30 p.m. on Saturday, February 15.
