

Senior wide receiver Noah Wanzek was originally torn between staying home to play basketball at the University of Jamestown or moving to Grand Forks to play football for the University of North Dakota. Since the moment he committed to UND, he hasn't looked back.

"UND really was the best opportunity for me," Wanzek said. "Everything about it has been good."

Wanzek has led the Fighting Hawks in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns in both his sophomore and junior years. He also ranked in the top 80 of all FCS in receiving yards during the 2018 season, which is quite the feat considering that UND has been a run-first offense. Wanzek has pro-

gressed a lot over the years. During his freshman year, he was thrown into a starting position due to injuries on the team. Although he didn't feel like he was completely ready at the time, the experience offered him the opportunity to push his boundaries and grow a lot on the field.

"My freshman year I just wasn't physically ready. I wouldn't change anything about it though, I love to play," Wanzek said. "I just think over time I've gotten stronger, faster and smarter. I've grown a lot in terms of football IQ."

The improvement is easily seen on paper. Wanzek went from an average of 30.6 yards per game to 64.8 yards per game between his freshman and sophomore year. Topping the stats sheets put him in a role where teammates look to him for

Sam Houston State currently boasts the same record as UND, sitting at 1-1. Head Coach Bubba Schweigert is focused on the cohesiveness going into the Potato Bowl against SHSU.

"We've got a big week coming up. We have a nationally ranked team coming in," Schweigert said. "We have to have a good week of preparation in order to give ourselves a good opportunity of a positive result on Saturday. We really have to focus on the total plan and everyone knowing that plan."

Wanzek also acknowledged the preparation that the team will need this week before taking on the Bearkats on Saturday. He looks forward to the Potato Bowl every year and is confident that the support of UND will give the team motivation going into the weekend.

"I'm really excited for this weekend," Wanzek said. "The Potato Bowl always seems to get a ton of fans. Last year we had a little bit of a tough game, so I think everyone's going to be fired up about it." The Potato Bowl

kicks off at 4 p.m. at the Alerus Center in Grand Forks.

NATHAN STEWART

Nathan Stewart is a 6-foot tall senior wide receiver out of Dallas, Texas. A product of Bryan Adams High School, Stewart put together a career that featured 59 receptions, 11 touchdowns and over 1,000 yards and earned him the honor of being the Bryan Adams Cougars' Offensive MVP. performance garnered him offers from the Idaho Vandals and Sam Houston State University.

After receiving an offer from SHSU on Nov. 8, 2015, Stewart committed to being a Bearkat on Jan. 7, 2016 and signed his letter of intent Feb. 3. He took the field for the first time in orange and white on Sept. 3, and he has been a staple of SHSU football ever since.

a freshman, As Stewart burst onto the scene Oct. 15, 2016 with five catches for 129 yards and a pair of touchdowns against Abilene Christian University. The soon-to-be star wideout accompanied Davion Davis and Yedidiah Louis as one of the most dominant receiving corps in the country. On Nov. 5, 2016, Stewart was a human highlight reel in a 56-43 victory over Mc-Neese when he had a career-high 12 receptions for an incredible 268 yards. That contest was also the first of three times that he would score a trio of touchdowns in the same game. After finishing his

freshman campaign with 52 receptions for 1,004 yards and a dozen touchdowns, the accolades quickly began to pile up for Stewart. He notched the Southland Conference Freshman of the Year award and was named a firstteam All-SLC receiver in 2016 and 2017. As good as Stewart's first season was, however, his best



was yet to come.
He had his breakout year in 2017 when he led all of FCS football with 1,648 receiving yards. Just a sophomore at the time, his explosive route running and impressive hands propelled him to an average of 117.7 yards per game. He finished the year with 72 catches and 14 touchdowns.

On Sept. 29, 2018 in a game against the University of Central Arkansas, Stewart became the fastest Bearkat in school history to ever eclipse 3,000 career receiving yards. The longest reception of his career came on Nov. 10 against ACU when freshman quarterback Ty Brock connected with Stewart for an 88-yard touchdown in the third quarter. Despite finishing 2018 with a season-low five touchdowns, he still complied 1,063 yards on 58 receptions.

When the Bearkats and Fighting Hawks faced off in 2018, Stewart played a mild role as UND beat SHSU 24-23 at Bowers Stadium. A junior at the time, he had five receptions for 74 yards and finished the game without a touchdown. Stewart will look to be a much more prominent factor in the rematch as he enters the week three contest against North Dakota with only eight catches for 97 yards so far this year. He has some work

to do, but with the 2019 season underway he aims to become just the third player ever in FCS history to rack up at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of his four seasons.




WHAT ARE THE ODDS?



UND is coming off a challenging matchup with NDSU last weekend, but it allowed the team to get exposed to an extremely talented offense and defense. The large amount of time on the field for UND defense was a big point of discussion after the game. The team will look to control that coming up against a strong and quick Sam Houston State offense. On average, both SHSU and UND have dominated the passing games against their opponents this year. However, SHSU has racked up almost three times as many rushing yards as UND.



Last year, UND edged out SHSU 24-23 in Texas to put an end to the longest home winning streak in the FCS: 21 games. The two teams were even in first downs and pretty close in passing yards. The thing that brought this game home for UND was the rushing offense. UND ended the game with 187 rushing yards compared to only 99 rushing yards for SHSU. This provides an interesting factor for Saturday's game, being as the run game at UND has not been as prevalent this season.


